Over the past 34 years, The American Chestnut Foundation® (TACF) has led the effort to restore the American chestnut, bringing this important issue to the forefront of current conservation initiatives. The TACF 2017 Annual Meeting will bring together scientists, conservationists, private landowners and industry professionals to share information and perspectives about the American chestnut and inspire reintroduction of this species to eastern forests. The meeting will provide an opportunity to enhance awareness of the importance of American chestnut restoration, explore partnerships, exchange information and discuss this exciting project with a wide audience.

POSTER SESSION

TACF's poster session aims to recognize the breadth of topics under investigation in the name of species restoration. It is a great way to expose attendees to the most current research, and the variety of American chestnut projects being pursued. Research posters are sought that address topics relative to American chestnut restoration and include, but are not limited to:

Please format your abstract as follows:

Abstract Title in Calibri, 16pt font, bold

Author last name, first initial, middle initial¹; co-author last name, first initial, middle initial²; etc. Year. (Times New Roman, 12pt font, bold)

¹Institution, address, city, state (Times New Roman, 12pt font)

²Institution, address, city, state (Times New Roman, 12pt font)

Abstract text should be limited to 200-300 words (Times New Roman, 12pt font). The abstract should contain a concise but comprehensive statement of the problem/study objective(s) and results. All abstracts should be written carefully and accurately. Abstracts that do not follow these explicit guidelines will not be accepted.

Key words: Optional.
